

Keynote Address: Diverse and Inclusive Leadership for the 21st Century



Jean Lau Chin, EdD, ABPP

Jean Lau Chin, EdD, ABPP is Professor at Adelphi University in New York, and is 2018 Fulbright Scholar as Distinguished Chair to the University of Sydney, Australia. She has held leadership roles as former Dean at Adelphi University, Systemwide Dean at Alliant International University, Executive Director of South Cove Community Health Center and Co-Director of Thom Mental Health Clinic. Currently, her scholarship is on global and diverse leadership which includes examining women and ethnic minority issues which includes 18 books and many publications and talks. Her most recent is: *Global and Culturally Diverse Leaders and Leadership: Challenges for Business, Education and Society*. She is the first Asian American to be licensed as a psychologist in Massachusetts and among the top 10 nationally. Active in service to the profession, she is currently Past-Chair, Council Leadership Team of the American Psychological Association and President

of the International Council of Psychologists and running for APA President 2020.

Keynote Address: Rise Up: A Call to AAPI Feminist Psychologists



Debra M. Kawahara, PhD

Dr. Debra M. Kawahara earned her BA in Psychology at the University of California, Los Angeles and earned her doctorate in clinical psychology with a focus on multicultural and community psychology from the California School of Professional Psychology. She is currently the Associate Dean of Academic Affairs and Professor at the California School of Professional Psychology, Alliant International University. Dr. Kawahara is a feminist and multicultural scholar whose work centers on intersectionality, women of color, particularly Asian American women, and the application of feminist and multicultural values and social justice principles. She is widely published, and in 2018, she became the first Asian American editor of *Women & Therapy*. She has served as chair for over 30 dissertations and enjoys mentoring many aspiring feminist and multicultural psychologists, particularly women and those of color. She is a Fellow of

APA Divisions 35 and 45 and the Asian American Psychological Association. In recognition of her work, she was awarded the Shining Star Award at the National Multicultural Conference & Summit in 2017. In 2015, she received Division 45's Distinguished Career Contributions for Service Award, and in 2012, she received Division 35's Pioneer Award (Section 5, Asian Pacific Islander Women). She is also being featured in APA's *I am Psyched!* Inspiring Histories, Inspiring Lives: Women of Color in Psychology, a pop-up exhibit highlighting the life and work of women of color in psychology and encouraging young women and girls of color to explore psychology and learn how psychology can be used for social change.

Increasing Physical Activity Participation for Asian American Women

Christina Nikitopoulous, Stephanie Cazeau, Emma Botelho, Ivy Ho, Ph.D., University of Massachusetts, Lowell

This Roundtable Discussion will focus on the importance of physical activity for Asian American women and how they can better incorporate it into their lives to maintain or improve their health as they age. The benefits and approaches of incorporating physical activity into the lives of Asian American female youth as they are growing up will also be discussed. Finally, this discussion will focus on ways that prevention programming through medical and community avenues as well as fitness organizations can address the cultural relevance to Asian American women in order to increase the participation level of physical activity.

Accessories to an Outfit?: Understanding Simultaneous Visibility & Invisibility among Asian American Women Faculty in Academia

Grace S. Kim, Ph.D., Boston University & Yuki Okubo, Ph.D., Salisbury University

Asian American women faculty navigate the juxtaposition of simultaneously being visible and invisible in academia. While very visible due to race and gender, lived experiences of Asian American women faculty are rendered invisible because of the racialized, gendered, and classed assumptions that are placed on them. Building on feminist and critical race theories, a theoretical framework was developed for better understanding the visibility-invisibility juxtaposition of Asian American women faculty by using the analogy of an accessory. An accessory, while clearly visible at first, is utilized in a non-essential and supplementary role to enhance an outfit rather than being an integral part of the system. In this roundtable discussion, we would like to have engaged discussions with the attendees what it is like to be Asian American women faculty, how this analogy of being an accessory to an outfit may illustrate our positionality in academia, and how to tell a counter-narrative to being an accessory.

Navigating Feminist Identity in the World of Academic Grant Writing

The purpose of this presentation is 1) to carefully examine this under-representation of women in scientific research, 2) to engage the audience in a discussion about challenges or opportunities that they may have experienced as a woman/feminist researcher in the areas of grant writing and submission, and 3) to brainstorm suggestions together to create a culture that promotes women in scientific research.

Feminist Practice in Peer Mentoring: Working and Laughing Together on a Special Issue in Women & Therapy - Khanh Dinh

Khanh T. Dinh, Ph.D., University of Massachusetts, Lowell; Ivy Ho, Ph.D., University of Massachusetts, Lowell; & Debra Kawahara, Ph.D., CSPP, Alliant International University

This workshop highlights our feminist experiences in working together on a special journal issue for *Women & Therapy*, entitled “Trauma and well-being among Asian American Women.” Our first objective is to share the extensive work involved in producing a special issue so as to help pave the way for early-career AAPI feminist scholars to engage in professional leadership work. Our second objective is to highlight the importance of feminist peer mentoring. Feminist work in any realm requires a constant mindfulness of one’s position of privilege and power in the world and our positionality in relation to those around us, including how best to “lift as we climb.” Our third objective is to emphatically share the radical notion that being a feminist and doing feminist work is above all else, fun, and we encourage everyone to take on the work of feminism and spreading this fun work to other members of our local and global communities.

Peace in Self-Care

Acknowledging the shared trauma that we, as Asian American feminist psychologists, carry, along with our students, trainees, clients, friends, and family, how do we care for ourselves? This workshop provides opportunities both to hold each other in our stress, but also in group meditation. Research has demonstrated that group meditation provides synergies and support different from that of individual meditation practice. As we come together in guided meditation, we can enjoy an experience of shared peace, a timeout from current and historical traumas.

Advocating for Oneself as an AAPI Woman at Work: Power and Privilege

This roundtable is to create a space for AAPI feminist psychologists to engage in conversation around the intersections of their professional and personal identities at the workplace. Discussion is grounded in

MIXING BUSINESS WITH PLEASURE- MERRIMACK 2

The Filipina Breast: Healing Intergenerational Trauma through Martial Arts and Poetry

Jacqueline R. Barco, M.Ed., M.S., University of Utah

This workshop will be a demonstration of expressive arts using martial arts and poetry to explore the ways that intergenerational trauma and its messages of gender, race, and sexuality were transmitted from my Filipina mother to me. Using Caruth's (1996) *The Wound and the Voice* and Hirsch's (2002) *Marked by Memory: Feminist Reflections on Trauma and Transmission*, I position my poetry and expressive arts as a form of feminist postmemory, as it attempts to create "connections across the differences of gender, race, and generation" (Hirsch, 2002, p. 88). I explore the ways that my poetry risks recreating what Hirsch (2002) described as appropriation through my own embodiment of transmission of intergenerational trauma. I anchor the memory and the analysis of Filipino women and colonialism with what Nerissa S. Balce's (2006) calls, “the erotics of the American Empire” in *The Filipina's Breast: Savagery, Docility, and the Erotics of the American Empire*.

Mentoring Matters: Asian American Women Creating Mutually Empowering Relationships

Shamaila Khan, Ph.D., Shin Ock, M.A., Noor Tahirkheli, Boston University School of Medicine

Aligning with recent cultural and social shifts attributed to the collective power and solidarity of women, this round table discussion highlights unique intersections of identities among Asian American women in psychology. The strengths and resilience exhibited by these women, particularly within the discipline of psychology, have been paid little attention. This round table discussion will present the experiences of three Asian American women as mentors and mentees, each of whom are located at different points in their psychology training/careers. Participants will have the opportunity to engage in discussion reflecting upon their own mentorship experiences, relative to their ethnic, racial and gender identities. The goal of this roundtable discussion is to create a space to amplify the voices of individuals who hold uniquely intersectional and marginalized identities, to build connections across difference and similarity, and shed light on available resources to support efforts for continued change in other less diverse spaces.

Righteous Rage: an Invitation to Voice Our Anger with Creativity


This workshop is designed to be a multimedia discussion and expression of “righteous rage”; that we have experienced as feminist API psychologists. As API women, we may have been socialized to find it particularly difficult to acknowledge or express anger. Conversely, as API women who have been stereotyped as quiet and demure, we may find expression of anger and rage to be liberating, and perhaps turn to it as a form of resistance to racism and patriarchy. The coordinators seek to provide a safe and supportive environment for exploring, expressing, and processing these powerful and, at times, overwhelming feelings. We hope to discuss a variety of ways in which rage plays a part in our relationships, profession, cultural, and political participation in the world. Participants are invited to bring creative expressions of their feelings, or just come as they are in community around the concept, phenomenon, expression or repression of rage. The coordinators are committed to creating a supportive safer space for this workshop, and invite participants to engage without fear of judgment, adverse consequence, or denial of their phenomenological experiences.

Self-Compassion and Psychological Well-Being of Asian Americans

Although self-compassion is derived from Buddhism, Asian American psychology scholars have not yet been involved in research around this construct. This roundtable discussion will examine self-

compassion from the perspective of Asian American feminist psychology. Specifically, this interactive session will examine the role of self-compassion in understanding Asian American women’s mental health and determine potential areas of research that Asian American feminist can apply self-compassion to promote psychological well-being of Asian Americans.

Unheard voices: body image and eating concerns in Asian populations

Although research has consistently focused on the critical role of sociocultural factors in issues related to body image, there have been limited studies on how Asian populations experiences their body image and eating concerns. This session will explore a systemic review of Asian populations in body image and eating concern literature in psychology. Implications and suggestions for future research and practice will be further discussed based on a feminist intersectional framework.

Lao She, Sensei, Giao Su: Mentorship of AAPI Feminists

This roundtable discussion will provide an opportunity for participants to have access and to meet with AAPI feminist leaders and mentors of Division 35 Section 5 who integrate feminist values such as collaboration, empowerment, and person-in- context into their mentoring. The format of this roundtable discussion will be more informal in nature and emergent in design with the goal of creating a space of safety and intimacy. The session will be heavily dependent on what the participants would like to discuss. Some potential topics could include: staying authentic and genuine through it all or being my BADASS self; balancing family and professional life; and specific professional areas such as research and grants, practice-oriented careers, academic administration, and service & governance. Strategies and recommendations will be shared. The last part of the roundtable discussion will focus on how the connections in the session can be built and sustained after the convention.

Asian American Feminism: Identity and Resistance

Nina Lei, M.S., LMHC, Independent Practice, Anjali Jacob, Brandon Velez, P.h.D., Teachers College, Columbia University.

In this workshop, participants will reflect on their identity as AAPI feminists and their role as agents of social justice. Who is an Asian American feminist? Together we will reinforce that there is no singular definition of feminism and that feminists not only have different backgrounds and experiences, but perspectives as well. Through group discussion and activity, we will see that acts of resistance come in all forms, and as feminists we can engage in those which we are comfortable with. The workshop will be a safe space where participants can share and learn from each others' thoughts and experiences, to help create and strengthen community.

Understanding Healthcare Needs and Barriers among Immigrant Asians: an Overview of Research Perspectives and Implications for Practice

The recent growth of AAPI community in the United States indicates calls for better understanding of the heterogeneity and culture specific healthcare needs and barriers today. However, mental health disparities across various ethnic minority groups (East Asia, South Asia, Southeast Asia, Middle East Asian countries) have not been sufficiently addressed (Leong & Lau, 2001). This presentation aims to highlight findings of recent projects that explored individual/contextual correlates of health risk behavior and preferred service areas.

Self Compassion into Action

The role of women as caregivers in family and community systems have been ubiquitous and as women living in the tension of multiple roles, caregiver, breadwinner, community organizer and CEO, these roles of female leadership or "soft power" have often been unrecognized. At times we may experience a stretching and commodification of our labor and of ourselves. The high expectations with little support, may lead to feelings of guilt, shame, and unworthiness. These are all symptoms of vicarious trauma and compassion fatigue. This workshop will feature an opportunity to experiment with meditation with a particular focus on the experiences of mindful self-compassion and equanimity.

Affiliates of the section shall be entitled to the following:

- To attend and to participate in the meetings of the section
- To receive the publications of the section
- To serve on the committees of the section

Affiliates may not hold office, vote in regular or special election, or serve as voting members of committees of the section


